### Alonsa School Life

Alonsa School is a K-12 school with an enrollment of 125 students. There is a professional staff of 12 and support staff of 5. There is one secretary, one librarian, one caretaker and one cleaner as well as five bus drivers. All work together to create a positive and clean learning environment.

This year we had additional support. We had one community connector and a community connector support worker. Both play an important role in providing school services to students and community members. Both the breakfast, lunch and snack programs have been enhanced.

School personnel work to make a difference by recognizing, encouraging and celebrating student learning. To fulfill this motto and to accomplish this mission all staff strive to provide a safe and support-



ive learning environment that promotes the unique academic, social and physical development of all students.

Alonsa School has monthly reports on students progress—some formal and some informal. In addition, parents can access Maplewood for up-to-date information about student attendance, assignments, progress and marks. Parents can gain access to the network by contacting the school with a request.

#### **Alonsa School**

Student attendance has been an area of concern over this school year. Student success is connected to student attendance. As absenteeism occurs, gaps in learning occur. With more absences, there are larger gaps, that will impede student performance in subsequent years.

The school focus for this year will continue to be on literacy, numeracy, student engagement and mental health and sustainable development.

### Provincial Examinations, Assessments, Goals

Each semester students write the divisional or local examinations. For this school, the ELA and Math Courses have provincial exams written in June. Grade 9 to 11 math have divisionally set exams. All other required courses have regularly scheduled exams in either January or June depending on their time of completion.

Last year the Grade 12s writing

- the ELA Provincial exam performed below the provincial average.
- Our school average on the Essential Math provincial exam was slightly below the provincial average.

 Our school average, on the applied math exam, was well above the provincial average.

This year, there were three Provincial Examinations—two in Math and one in ELA. How we compare with the provincial will not be known until next school year.

#### mRLC

Currently Gr. 4 to 9 are following the instruction pattern of the mRLC for math. Results for all levels have been very positive.

Division and School Goals

Nine out of 10 Grade 7 students last year received standing in Grade 7 Math.



Seven out of 8 Grade 8 students last year received standing in Grade 8 ELA.

There is a relatively stable reporting of positive school climate, academic engagement and mental health indicators by the school students.

There is continued involvement of students in education for sustainable development.

### Grade Level Success and Credit Attainment

Last year all students from K to Gr. 6 successfully completed their year and advanced to the next year. .

Of the Grade 7 to 12 students, 46 of 58 students achieved their credits in math. Of those that did not achieve credits they will have additional supports to be successful.

For the ELA classes, 42 of 55 students achieved their credits in ELA. For those

that did not achieve credits, they will have additional supports to be successful.

In Gr. 3 and 6 most students were either meeting or approaching numeracy expectations and reading comprehension expectations.

In Gr. 7 almost all students were meeting or approaching the Mid-Grade 7 level of the Number Sense Assessment and are

developing or established in all categories of the Student Engagement.



In the Grade 8 reading and expository writing, most students were either approaching or meeting the performance.

### Continuous Improvement

Data is collected and evaluated so that decisions can be made and implemented.

Teachers and EA's work with the purpose of fostering in students the capability of working successfully and independently.

There has been the implementation of an opportunity room as a second step in behavior intervention. Students who have difficulty self regulating or are injurious to themselves or others are provided opportunities to self-regulate first in the classroom and then the opportunity room before coming to the office for further interventions..

This year, phone calls were made regarding attendance of students. Student attendance is important for the continued success of all students. As absences increase, instruction is missed and gaps in learning occur. With more absences the gaps get bigger. We are working to close these gaps, and with parental assistance we will succeed.

All progress begins with a dream. What we can conceive we are able to achieve.

Our Breakfast program has changed with the addition of a community connector support worker. She prepared the breakfasts, snacks and lunches while the Community connector can reach out and support families of this area.

Anyone arriving at the school was to come to the south door where there is door bell. Someone from the office will be able to come to that door to help you.

The other doors were not have monitored

entrances during the regular school hours.

In addition, anyone coming to the school who was not known by the staff monitoring the door was be asked to identify themselves and the purpose of the visit.

Staff and students are aware of the importance of the lock and secure procedure. Although it may be inconvenient it is for the purpose of student and staff safety.

These procedures will continue unless



there is a viable system that allows for changes to occur but safety to be maintained.

## LIBRARY NEWS

WELCOME TO THE LIBRARY! Everyone in our school has the opportunity to visit the library. Regular Library classes are scheduled for the Kindergarten to Grade 8 following the six-day cycle. Pre-School students visit me every Thursday. All students have the opportunity to visit me first thing in the morning any day of the week to exchange their books as often as they like!

All students from Grades from 9-12 have the opportunity to come down to the library during their study periods, lunch and regular breaks to sign out books, work on assignments, study and read.

This year we held two Scholastic Book Fairs. As always, I wish to thank everyone who purchases items at these Book Fairs as every purchase benefits our school by putting new books on our shelves and into the hands of our students! Your support helps us build a library that I am proud of! Our September 2018 Book Fair earned us 50% of our sales which was \$750 in free books; and our February 2019 Book Fair earned us 70% of sales which was \$865!! We qualified for the two extra bonuses in the month of February—10% extra for it being our second Book Fair of the Year and an additional 10% for having it during the month of February which is "I Love to Read Month". Thank you to Mrs. Diane Sucharyna for running February's Book Fair, it takes a lot of hard work to set up and run the Book Fair and Prize contests and we were fortunate she took on this event for us all! I look forward to next year's September fair that again will be held during our Meet the Teacher/Open House Event!

I also organize the Scholastic Book Club Orders that are placed throughout the year from Kindergarten to Grade 12. We do receive a small percentage back on the monthly book orders as well, all of which is also put right back onto the shelves of our library. These orders are not sent out every month but are placed at key times of the year such as Christmas and some other months that are not our Book Fair months.

Is there a certain book you would like to see in our collection? I am always asking for ideas from students and staff as to which books they would like to see in our library. I do my best to order books that engage and interest all ages and if anyone has suggestions, I welcome them.
