Course Description

Reading is Thinking is a course like no other. World renowned dance choreographer Twyla Tharp says that, "the two things that will have the greatest impact on you over the next five years are the people that you will meet and what you will read." A powerful realization if you think about it. People really don't pay that much attention to how they read or what they are doing to make meaning out of a text. Seriously, have you ever spent any time considering how you made sense out of a book, article or video that you have looked at in the past? You've certainly developed a strategy or two over the years to help you with this, but you may be hard-pressed to explain just how you did it. This class aims to take what you know and then expand on it. Reading is Thinking is a course designed to help you improve your skills in reading and thinking critically and creatively.

Course Focus

- Thinking About Self: Students develop their identities as confident, engaged, and motivated readers within their diverse communities.
- Thinking About Text: Students develop the characteristics and practices of proficient readers before, during, and after reading within and across disciplines.
- Thinking About the World: Students will develop critical reading/literacy in order to develop deeper understanding of a variety of texts in order to express and substantiate personal positions and to solve problems, make decisions, resolve conflicts, and take action in their world.

Themes & Units of Study

- 1. Who am I as a Reader? Different perspectives/lenses Time Period September
- 2. **Reading Strategies: Fiction** Questioning, Predicting, Visualizing, Connecting, Experiencing, Clarifying
 Time Period October
- Reading Strategies: Non-Fiction Text Features, Text Structures, Making Inferences, Summarizing, Identify Author's Purpose, Bias, Synthesizing

Time Period November

4. **Final Assessment: Independent Reading:** Self-Assessment of Reading Goals and Accomplishments

Time Period September-December

Note: Units/Topics are subject to change due to availability of resources, time, or unforeseen events at the discretion of instructor.

 this course NEEDS TO BE KEPT UNTIL THE END OF THE COURSE. This means you will need to be
 responsible for gathering and keeping your work together.
- Independent Reading will be required as part of this course and used as the Final Assessment for this course. You will be reflecting on your own progress with the Independent Reading component.

Course Requirements

- Regular Attendance is required to demonstrate a consistent and sustained achievement of the outcomes necessary to earn the credit for this course. Regular attendance is defined by our school attendance policy; see Student Handbook.
- **Due Dates**: It becomes very challenging to track your progress throughout the semester and to understand your true abilities if work is not completed. In order for me to give feedback in a timely manner and to assess fairly, **due dates must be respected**. If due dates are consistently **not adhered to**, you will **receive a zero (0%) at the reporting periods**. Once a reporting period has passed; no previous work will be accepted.
