


WHAT'S HAPPENING!


n Math we worked through shapes and angles and are finishing the year off with data and graphing. Our protractors are tired, time to get out the graph paper!

Another spring has come, and almost gone, and here we are again in our last newsletter of the school year. As our students begin to get ready for summer adventures and start to look back on all of the things they have accomplished this year a quiet hum of excitement quickly fills the air. As always, our students have put their creativity to good use and have approached their learning in new and engaging ways this year.

In Art, our Grade 7/8 students spent the last part of spring inspired by the great outdoors as reflected in their creative thinking processes demonstrated in their art journals. Students also spent time utilizing cross-curricular skills to apply colour theory with their hands on use of geometry kits to create geometric flower art.

Since then our classroom has been as busy as a hive full of bees as students have spent time flexing their creative writing muscles to develop adventurous and engaging texts to repurpose and adapt into children's storybooks.

Many classes, like Grade 7/8 ELA and Grade 9/10 Digital Pictures, have been busy this spring with a multitude of different activities and projects. It's hard to put into words all of the interesting ideas and questions that pop up and lead us into rabbit holes of discovery when engaging in student-led learning opportunities. Please continue to nurture your student's creativity and inquisitive nature as it is constantly leading them to new discoveries and interests.

Lastly, our Grade 11/12 students in Canadian History have been running a gauntlet of information overload as they wrap up their studies of the 20th century and begin to focus on modern times again. Kayley –1st in Kick Punt Pass, 2nd in Bocce & Triple Jump


Silas – 2nd in Shotput, 3rd in Discus
