1. Literacy
By June 2024, 85% of all students in grades 1 to 8 will either be reading at grade level or increase their reading by one grade level, as measured with the Fountas and Pinnell assessment tool.

MET – 85.4% of students in Grades 1 to 8 demonstrated reading either at their grade level or increased their reading by one grade level.

**2. Numeracy**By May of 2024, 70% of all students in grades 1 to 8 will achieve an ordinal grade average in Mathematics Categories of "3 "or higher on their Year-End Provincial Report Card.

**MET –** 70.2% of students in Grades 1 to 8 achieved a final math grade average of "3" or higher on their Year-End Report Card.

- Professional staff were asked to pre-plan and brainstorm ideas prior to an initial planning meeting. Available literacy and numeracy data and results from the 2023-2024 school goals were shared with staff to provide additional information.
- Students completed the OurSchool survey, providing information in various areas. A staff meeting was held to discuss the results and analyze and interpret the data/information. Causal theories and conclusions were made based on observations....
- 2023/2024 reading assessment data as well as mRLC numeracy quizzes scores were reviewed.
- We looked at the Early Years and Middle Years Provincial Assessment Data, the EYE Data, mRLC Formative Quiz data, Year-End Reading Assessment Data, and the Our School Survey
